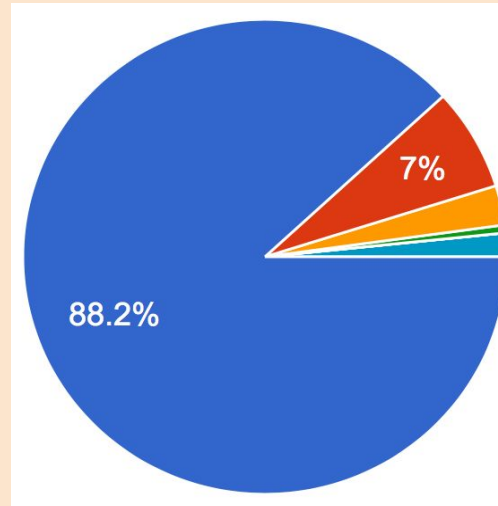

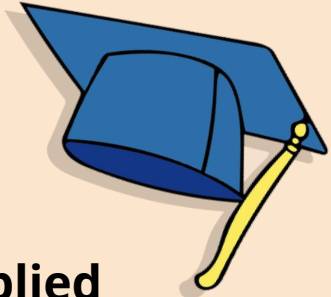

- 1,112 total applications submitted
- 613 total acceptances
- 55% overall acceptance rate
- 76 students to accepted at every school to which they applied



Merit Based Aid

- 100 students received merit scholarship offers from colleges
(53.5%)

- **66 students applied ED I (35%)**
 - **Male: 30**
 - **Female: 36**
- **46 students accepted ED I (70%)**
 - **Male: 24**
 - **Female: 22**
- **20 students were not accepted (30%)**
- **13 students applied ED II (7%)**
 - **Female: 7**
 - **Male: 6**
- **8 students were accepted ED II**
 - **Female: 3**
 - **Male: 5**
- **4 students were not accepted ED II**
- **1 student waitlisted**

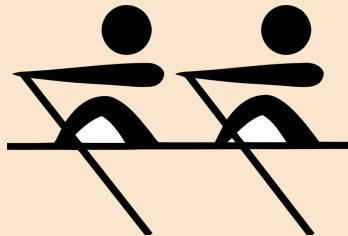

Suggestions from Graduating Seniors

96 students added suggestions:

- Majority of comments were recommending the college discussion/process occur prior to their junior/senior year
- Reaching out to students more throughout the year
- Making attempts to decrease the stigma around college and expectations associated
- Reach out to other people about their experiences at the schools and their applications
- More in school help with completing the Common App & essays
- Assist in diversifying a student's list
- More assistance finding and completing scholarships
- Workshops regarding college application process
- Easier methods of scheduling appointments in the counseling office
- Get parents more involved
- Structured assemblies on financial aid for parents
